So far they have avoided our cameras, but they are a great distraction when sitting in meetings. We have been cutting the hedges back too. We will let them grow again, but they will be kept at a much more manageable height.

A visit from the very nice people of Isle of Wight Beach Cleaning Volunteers prompted us to unpack our litter –pickers. They even marked them up for us, so now they are available for other groups to use.

SWANMORE MEADOWS

Through the urban fringes of Ryde Monkton Mead Brook is lined by the species-rich grasslands of Swanmore Meadows. These grasslands, developed over calcareous clay marls, support a great variety of wild flowers including an abundance of common century, bird's foot trefoil, agrimony and the occasional pyramidal orchid. Butterflies also abound in these meadows with marbled white, large skipper and common blue all abundant. Unfortunately, a lack of management has allowed scrub to encroach over much of the meadow grassland which is now confined to a series of open glades along the length of the public footpath. At the top of the site there is woodland and a pond.
